"BEAUSOLEIL" BROUSSARD LEADS THE WAY - AGAIN!

Deft brush strokes by master muralist Robert Dafford bring to life historic Acadian figures on the mural he has been commissioned to paint for the Acadian Memorial in St. Martinville, Louisiana. The 30' x 12' canvas is being filled with figures of exiled Acadians painted as though they are arriving in Louisiana in the mid-18th century.

Mural committee chairman Carole Lancon announced that work started on the massive painting in December 1993 and will be approximately 60% complete by April 1994 when the canvas will be transferred from Daffords studio to the Heymann Building on Jefferson Street in Lafayette, Louisiana, as part of an exhibit of his earlier paintings on The Acadian Exile. "Dafford will continue working on the painting while it is intro-

duced to the public during the 1994 Festival International exhibit", said Lancon.

"At the forefront of the painting," said Project co-chair Janie Bulliard, "is the figure of Joseph Beausoleil Broussard, so honored as a tribute to his leadership ability which was recognized in Nova Scotia and acknowledged in Louisiana when he was named commandant of the Attakapas District in April 1765." He died there on September 4, 1765," prematurely, perhaps, but not before he knew he had led his people to nouvelle Acadie." On his far right, is the figure of Pierre Richard, an early settler in the Opelousas Country who probably arrived in Louisiana in 1765 with Broussard. The Richard figure was funded with a donation of \$2,000 by "Des Richard de Partout, Inc.", an

organization of Richard descendants.

"On Broussard's left", Bulliard pointed out, "is the figure of a woman representing Elizabeth Thibodeau, widow of Cosme Brasseaux, who arrived in Louisiana in 1767 and who was settled, with her children, on the Mississippi River in the area of St. Gabriel."

Figures from all of the Açadian settlements in Louisiana continue to be developed on the mural and the public is invited to view its progress at Festival International in Lafayette, Louisiana, April 21 thru April 24, 1994. At that time, costumed docents will be present to tell stories of the mural figures.

The drawing for a trip to Canada to attend CONGRES MONDIAL ACADI-

Iberville names included on Wall

"arrête toi ami, lis mon nom et souviens toi"

(Pause friend, read my name and remember...)

This sentiment will caption the Wall of Names. More names to be remembered will be those of a group settled in present-day Iberville Parish in 1770. The story of their passage aboard the "Britain" follows this list.

Oliver Benoit. Marie Bruset, wife; Charles Benoit, son; Marie Rose Benoit, daughter; Magdalene Benoit, daughter.

In "The Founding of New Acadia", author and historian Carl Brasseaux tells us that "...thirty Acadians from Maryland--boarded the "Britain", a New Orleans bound schooner, at 'the port of [Port Tobacco,] Maryland' on January 5, 1769. The English vessel reached the mouth of the Mississippi River on February 21, but fog delayed ascent of the river, and strong easterly winds drove the vessel to Matagorda Bay, Texas. Upon reaching the Texas coast, the "Britain" was seized by Spanish authorities and the passengers and crew were arrested as smugglers. For a time the prisoners were confined at hard labor in Presidio de La Bahia (present day Goliad, Texas), but they were soon released. Arriving at Natchitoches in late October, the Acadians paused before pressing on to New Acadia. Commandant Athanaze Demezieres attempted to force them to remain at his Red River post, but he ultimately succumbed to Acadian recalcitrance. In mid-April, 1770, the exiles were given westbank land grants in present-day Iberville Parish."

LA CAROLINE -- LAST OF ACADIAN EXPEDITIONS

Acadian exiles who were among the last shipload of immigrants to arrive in Louisiana over 200 years ago were honored during a special commemorative mass held Sunday, Dec. 12, 1993 in St. Martin de Tours Catholic Church in St. Martinville, Louisiana.

Modern day Acadians bearing family names derived from these immigrants were special guests at the mass and carried banners denoting the families they represented.

At the same time the mass was being held in St. Martinville, another memorial mass was being offered in St. Martin de Chantenay Church in Nantes, France, which was the port of embarkation for the brig "Caroline" which carried the Acadian exiles to Louisiana. The ship entered the Mississippi River below New Orleans on Dec. 12, 1785.

La Caroline was the last of seven ships of what is called the "Acadian expeditions" which brought families to colonize Louisiana that year. They were part of approximately 3,000 persons who, after being expelled from Nova Scotia in 1755, eventually sought refuge in France, only to be disillusioned by a government apathetic to their needs. When, in 1785,

after nearly 30 years of wretched living conditions, they were told of a generous offer of arable land by Louisiana's Spanish government, some 1,596 Acadian refugees in France accepted the challenge to begin a new life in Louisiana.

The 25 families aboard the Caroline settled in the present day parishes of Ascension, Assumption, St. Landry, Pointe Coupee, St. James and St. Martin.

The Iberville list of names which appears on Page 2 is as found in "Spain in the Mississippi Valley, 1765-94..."
